NCBC Donates \$300 to AFA

At the July meeting, the members of the NCBC voted to donate \$300 to the American Federation of Aviculture (AFA) in the memory of Dick Ivy, who died recently. Besides founding the Bird Clubs of America (BCA), he was a past regional vice-president of the AFA and a well known breeder of Amazons and other parrots. The donation will be read at the AFA's August Convention.

August Speaker is Joe Pesche

He will be giving a multi-media presentation on his trip to Australia last September where he observed 10 different parrot species in the wild. The focus of his talk will be about the parrots of Australia.

House Guests by John Davey

I don't remember where I heard about this – it might have been from someone in the NCBC. Over the past 10 or so years, our family has hosted generations (I guess) of House Wrens (or House Finches) in our garage. These are the cute little brown and white birds, a little smaller than an English sparrow (Vermin!) with splayed wings and a cute little tail that sticks straight up in the back – like someone had kicked each little bird in their butt.

These little birds hop around in nervous little skips, making the cute "Peep. Peep. Peep." sound that finches make. Each year, especially in the winter, these House Wrens build a large stick nest on one of the shelves in the garage – or hidden off somewhere in a corner. Then they wait until we get home from work in the evening and open the garage door. They fly into the garage and stay overnight in their nest until morning when we again open the garage door. Then they fly out for a day's worth of Wren life.

I have always worried about these

little guys and my responsibility to be sure that the garage door opens and shuts on time – each morning and evening. I feel that I have to get up early on Saturday and Sunday mornings to open the door, just to let our guests out.

Somewhere (Was it at the NCBC?) I heard about someone who had purchased one of those woven finch nests that you can see at some larger pet supply stores. You know, the kind that looks like a small tear-shaped gourd with an entrance hole in the front. I went out and bought one of those Made-in-China nests and hung it under the front eaves of my house, just using a brass cup hook. Within two or three days – sure enough – the Wrens found that hanging nest and took up nighttime residence there.

It's funny to come home at night and look up at the nest to see one or two sets of tail feathers just sticking out of the entrance hole. And I now don't have to worry about keeping the Wrens' schedule.

CLUB NEWS

NCBC Minutes July 1, 2004

At the July 11th meeting, after discussion on how to honor Dick Ivy, the members voted on donating \$300 to the AFA at its August Convention. Tom Marshall suggested this and said that at the convention a list of names will be read telling that we donated and that it was donated in Dick Ivy's name. Dick Ivy was well known in the AFA as a breeder and as a past regional vice-president.

The speaker was from the Avian Health Network (Stop PDD). She explained that Proventricular Dilatation Disease (PDD), also known as macaw wasting disease, is a terrible and fatal avian disease and the efforts that have been made to fund research into finding

a non-invasive test. This is the first step before finding a cure. Currently the only definitive test is a crop biopsy to check for lesions and in many cases this can't be done because the bird is too ill.

It is believed that PDD is communicable but the virus itself has not yet been identified. The research on PDD is much like it was on AIDS before the French researchers discovered the HIV virus as the cause.

The major work being done on PDD research is by Branson Ritchie. He is a widely respected avian researcher working out of the University of Georgia, College of Veterinary Medicine – Emerging Diseases Research Group.

Bird owners whose birds have PDD also told of their experience. Kelsie Holtje mentioned that Dr. Ramelmeier, who is a holistic avian vet in the area,

has had success in treating this disease to the extent of keeping the birds alive. The speaker mentioned also that anti-inflammatory drugs are used by some vets to try and treat the lesions in the crop which prevent the birds from digesting their food.

A door prize was held by the speaker and a Stop PDD tee shirt and mousepad were awarded.

The co-vice presidents of the club have apparently not been active in their duties nor have responded to inquiries by the club president. Since they are out of touch with the club, the position of club vice-president is now considered vacant and the club is requesting that someone volunteer for this very important position. The main duty of the vice-president is lining up the speakers.
