Minutes for October 3, 2004 Meeting

There was no special speaker for the October meeting. It was a general business meeting and brain-storming session. Topics covered included way to increase membership and meeting attendance.

It was suggested and approved that Kelsie Holtje will be thanked in the next newsletter for her service as club president for the past nine months. Carol Rees has agreed to do this task

A vote was taken and the club voted to subscribe to Ed Cravens' newsletter which did cost \$12/year some time ago. It provides articles that can be included in our club newsletter. The actual cost may be higher than that but is not expected to exceed \$25. John Long will give Carol Rees the email address to obtain it.

Since The Animal Exchange is no longer providing items to raffle off, their advertisement will be discontinued in the newsletter.

A raffle will be held at all future meetings. John Long will provide the raffle items.

The club minutes from the previous month will be read at each meeting and approved by the attending members.

It was brought up that the newsletter exchange memberships should be reviewed. The club currently exchanges newsletters with 17 other entities.

The following board positions are open and need to be filled immediately: Vice-President, Ways and Means Committee Chairperson, and Publicity Committee Chairperson, and Library Committee Chairperson.

Moore will be in charge of organizing the NCBC table and will be assisted by Fran Feiner. An announcement about the bake sale will be put on the front page of the next newsletter.

The club is reinstating the club achievement award. A member will be selected by the general membership at the December meeting, and the award will be purchased and presents by BCV each year at the BCV convention banquet.

The club board of Director will meet at designated times to decide on the club's direction and goals and present their plan at the following meeting for club discussion.

Tammy Ellison volunteered to reserve the club meeting room for 2005 and will send Carol Rees the 2005 meeting dates after they are confirmed.

Carol Rees will send Laurel Rosinger and Andrew Buechele the electronic files she has for the club logo. They will attempt to refine the image and enlarge it. We need a good electronic version of the club logo for future fund raising projects such as club tee shirts, tote bags, and decals.

Wayne Porter will be looking into pricing information on golf and tee shirts.

Carol Rees will provide all of the board members with a current roster of the club members.

It was suggested that new members receive a membership kit. One suggestion was a list of area avian veterinarians. Carol Rees will provide the latest list that she has for this and it will be reviewed by the membership to make sure that it is accurate and complete to the best of our knowledge. ANIMAL WELFARE ACT: USDA WANTS TO HEAR FROM YOU!

Letter to AFA Members

Re: USDA Proposed Regulations: Animal Welfare; Regulations and Standards for Birds, Rats, and Mice

As a result of a lawsuit by an Animal Rights organization, the USDA is now forced to regulate birds under the Animal Welfare Act (AWA), but the USDA has no prior experience at regulating birds under the AWA. To facilitate a coordinated effort at developing appropriate recommendations from the perspective of the avicultural community, the National Avian Welfare Alliance (NAWA) was formed with representatives from a broad cross-section of bird specialty groups including, bird trainers and avian veterinarians, as well as organizations for keepers of racing pigeons, waterfowl and pheasants, finches, softbills, and parrots. NAWA has completed most of these recommended regulations and is preparing to submit them to the USDA.

At the 2004 AFA Convention, USDA representatives indicated that in order for our side to be heard, we needed to get our members to make comments regarding the impact that AWA regulations would have on those of us involved in keeping and breeding birds. They urged each of us to get all of our members to respond.

The participants in NAWA would like to urge you to make comments to the USDA to provide them with information on the impact of covering birds under the AWA. These comments can be made by the internet or letters to the USDA. The original comment period has been extended and Comments must be submitted by November 1, 2004. If we do not make these comments, the comments of the Animals Rights Activist side will be taken into consideration rather than ours. It is possible that all or most of us may be exempted from these regulations, if we get enough comments into the USDA showing the negative impact that AWA regulations would have on us.

NAWA has identified several key issues of concern. When making your comments, please emphasize some of these points:

1. The largest majority of us are Hobbyists for which bird breeding is not a money- making venture. Many facilities are lucky just to cover expenses and any added expenses under the AWA would force them out of raising birds.
2. Any inspections will have a detrimental effect on your ability to propagate any rare or endangered species because many rare or endangered species may kill their mates or abandon their nests while being inspected by a stranger.
3. The inspections are done in normal business hours and that most of us hold normal jobs that take us away at those times, so we would not be able to be present at the times we would be inspected or show our records to the inspectors.
4. The quantity of paperwork that is required under current AWA regulations (besides the paperwork you already may do for Fish and Wildlife and State Departments) is not possible for most bird keepers to maintain. It would require you to hire someone to keep up with the records alone. This represents an unreasonable burden on most and would force many to sell their birds due to the financial expense of hiring a bookkeeper.
5. The additional cost of keeping the birds to the current USDA requirements would be so costly that we could not afford to keep the birds we now have.
6. When people quit raising birds, the effect will be felt throughout our nation. The ripple effect of this taking place could cost the U.S. economy many hundreds of million of dollars and thousands of jobs as a result of greatly reduced demand for the wide variety of bird foods and bird-related equipment.
7. As the supply of domestic bred birds is decreased, the demand for smuggled birds will increase resulting in greater risk of the introduction of avian diseases such as Exotic Newcastles Disease.

PLEASE HELP BIRDS AND AVICULTURISTS AFFECTED BY THE HURRICANES THROUGH THE AFA DISASTER RELIEF FUND!

During Hurricane Andrew, the American Federation of Aviculture established a Disaster Relief Fund to assist aviculturists who have been affected by natural events such as hurricanes, wild fires, earthquakes, etc. AFA volunteers were involved in helping aviculturists and their birds deal with short term relief of their situations. When the wildfires hit California, assistance was made available from the Disaster Relief Fund and affected individuals were helped. Now, with hurricanes Charley, Frances and Ivan gone, the Disaster Relief Fund is there to help our friends in Florida and on the Gulf Coast.

From the day after hurricane Charley passed, Fred Smith, the AFA Regional Director for Florida, has been actively working to help those in need. He has been the focal point of offers of assistance, monetary and physical. Numerous people, organizations, and businesses have donated money, caging, food, and labor to get their fellow aviculturists on their feet again. In addition, if you are someone in need of assistance or know someone in need of assistance, please contact Fred at the above email or phone number immediately. He is coordinating all efforts and will respond as quickly as possible.

Experts in emergency management have indicated that oftentimes there is more relief and help needed weeks after the initial event as opposed to the first few days afterward. People have managed through their immediate crises. Many jobs have been lost, which means that bird food supplies are starting to dwindle. Birds that were loose have been caught, but are in carriers while their cages need repair. This is when the Disaster Relief Fund can help get people through their transition period until they are able to rebuild their lives. Again, please consider helping your fellow aviculturists recover from this natural disaster. Thank you to all the generous people who have already done so much to help.
