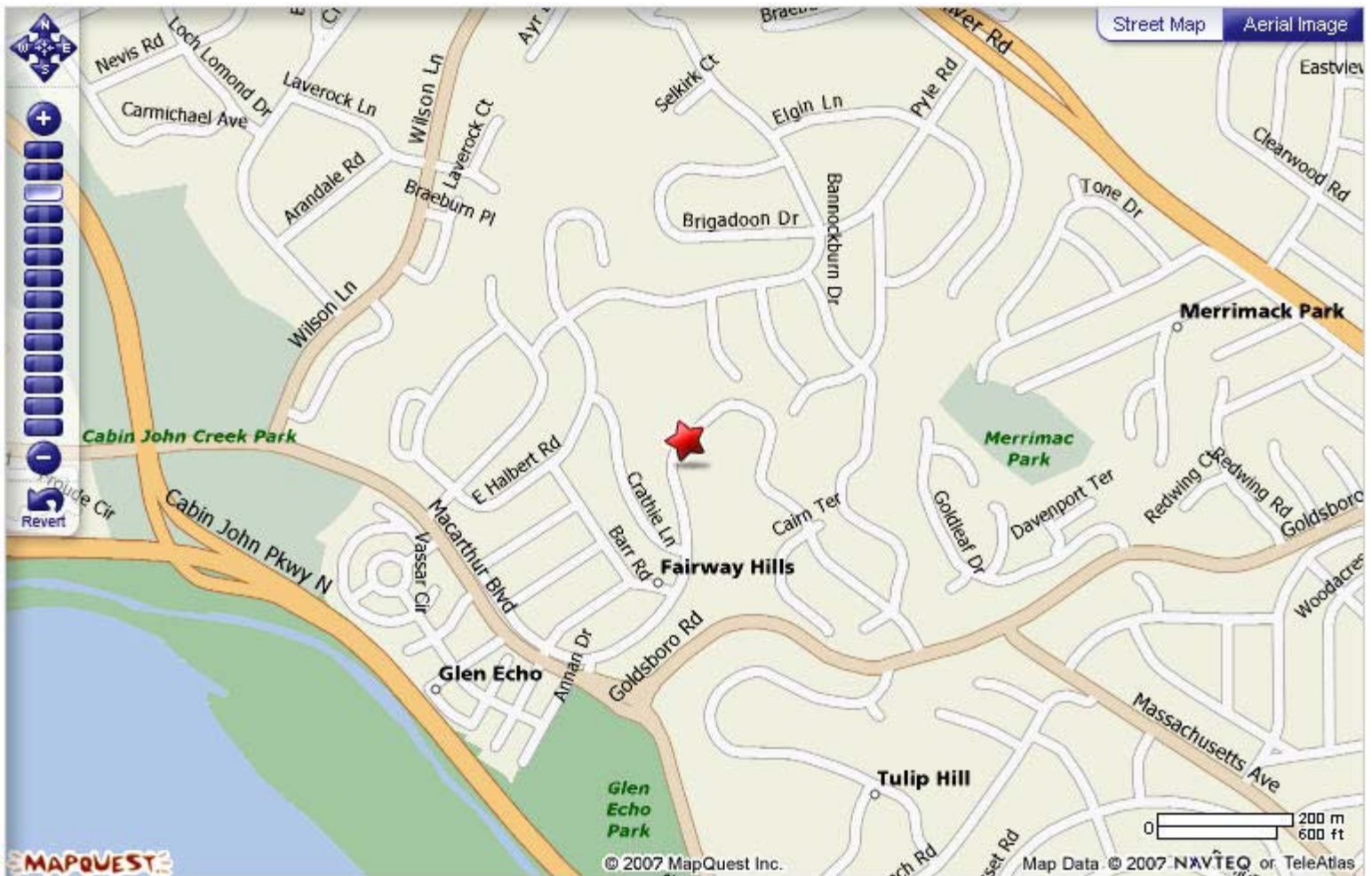

NCBC Minutes by Wendy Ernst

Mark Sargent was there to greet us in the Bird House at the National Zoo. He told about volunteer opportunities at the Zoo and the training required. Our tour guide, Ric Pinto, soon arrived and we proceeded to the indoor flight for the Bird House Enrichment Demonstration. We saw many lovely birds including the crowned pigeon, the violet turaco, a pair of cuckoos, the mot-mot, the sun bittern, the Argus pheasant, the silver beaked tanager and the lilac-breasted roller. The birds were fed “pinkies” (dead baby mice), mealy worms, wax worms, and the source of basic complete nutrition called “meatballs” – a special mixture that suits all the bird species in this area of the bird house.



In the Zoo’s indoor aviary, Ric Pinto gives treats to the birds and a lecture. The crowned pigeon at his feet was protecting its territory and showed no fear of people.

Next we were treated to a private viewing of the kiwi, (which is also available for the public on a regular basis). The birds used for this demonstration have been habituated to a daytime schedule (as opposed to their usual nocturnal existence). From time to time, the demo kiwi has been switched for another bird and goes back to the nocturnal schedule. Despite a sweet face with wide set eyes, the kiwi has strong legs and claws used for vigorous defense when necessary. The birds are large, weighing about 2 pounds, and lay large eggs, approximately 3" at the widest point and 5" tall. While we watched him in the Plexiglas display case, the bird used his long beak to search the bedding for food, and was given nightcrawler earthworms, which he ate with gusto. Ric gave us the full life story of a typical wild kiwi and explained the hazards of modern life for this bird, as well as conservation efforts in its native land, New Zealand.

We walked through the kitchen where keepers assemble the foods for the various birds (actual mixing/cooking preparation occurs elsewhere and the results are delivered each day). Also, we toured the indoor holding areas where birds are kept in flight cages for various reasons (they may be stressed or newcomers, for instance), the incubators, and medical treatment area. In outdoor holding areas, we got to see the rhea family and a cassowary who seems to have a crush on one of the keepers. In small groups, we each had the opportunity to feed grapes to the rheas, one of whom chose to roughly seize them directly from our fingers. A hungry rhea is not concerned if he bruises a finger here or there.

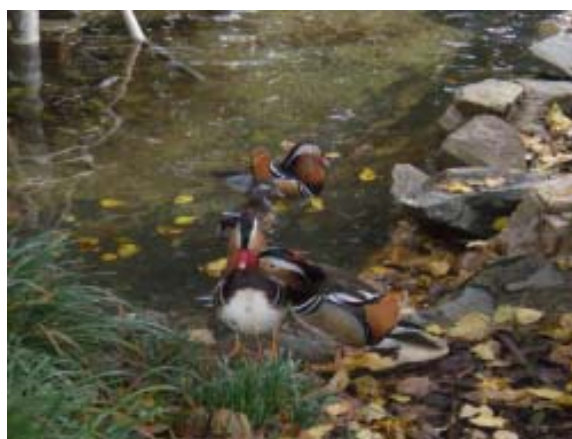

Finally, we wandered through the outdoor aviary, and saw so many birds – including a golden pheasant, peacocks and peahens, blue winged teal ducks, a hooded merganser or two, the bamboo partridge, a yellow breasted chat, and some familiar acquaintances such as some lucky robins and cardinals. We were able to throw mealworms down for them.

It really was such a wonderful experience, which cannot be adequately or completely described in words or pictures, topped off with beautiful weather. Thanks to Mark and Ric and Kitty for a memorable meeting.

National Zoo Opportunities

For those who want to become a Friend of the National Zoo (FONZ), you can sign up at <http://nationalzoo.si.edu/JoinFonz/Join/default.cfm> There are different levels of membership that include various benefits with the lowest the Zoogoer at only \$35. The Household membership is \$60 and in addition to the Zoogoer benefits includes event discounts, invitations to special previews, an invitation to an annual member appreciation event, opportunities to attend camps, classes and workshops, the opportunity to hold birthday parties at the Zoo and discounts on stroller rental. Donor levels of membership which are above the Household membership include additional benefits. All of the memberships include free Zoo parking and the Smithsonian Zoogoer magazine.

For a minimum of \$30 FONZ members can join the Zoo's Migratory Bird Club which supports bird conservation around the world. Membership includes an annual bird walk with a Smithsonian scientist, an informational newsletter, migratory bird computer wallpaper, a "Bird Friendly" coffee baseball cap, and invitations for bird themed lectures. The Zoo also offers the opportunity to "Adopt a Species". One of the species available for adoption is the North Island Brown Kiwi, which we saw in our Zoo tour. There are various levels of adoption but for most popular one at \$65 (\$45 of that is tax deductible) you will receive a plush kiwi animal packaged in its own animal carrier box along with a personalized certificate, a kiwi fact sheet, and a photo of a North Island brown kiwi. The Adopt a Species funds collected support exhibit improvement, medical care, and food for the Zoo's kiwis and the 2,000 other animals that live at the Zoo and its Conservation and Research Center located in Front Royal, Virginia.

National Capital Bird Club Offices Descriptions & Duties

Officers

The following officers are up for election. The next two-year term starts in January 2010 and ends in 2011.

President

Presides at all meetings, appoints all committees, approves all bills, and signs all checks in the absence of the Treasurer. Is an ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Vice-President

Performs the duties of the President in the absence of the President and is Chairman of the Program Committee. Also arranges for speakers for the monthly meetings.

Treasurer

Keeps all records of income and disbursements and pays by check all expenses authorized by the Club. Also receives all monies earned or due the Club, collects all dues, notifies members delinquent in payment of dues, notifies the Secretary when a member should be dropped from the roll for non-payment of dues, and makes a Financial Status Report at each monthly meeting and an Annual Financial Report at the end of the year.

Secretary

Keeps the minutes of the Club and Executive Board meetings and has custody of same, as well as conducting all of general correspondence of the Club.

Delegates

AFA Delegate

Attends AFA meetings and reports back to the club about issues discussed.

BCV Delegates

Attends BCV meetings and reports back to the club about issues discussed.

Standing Committees

These positions are also available, and everyone is eligible to volunteer for them as well. Standing Committee positions include:

Hospitality Committee

Recruits new members, greets new members and guests, and coordinates refreshments.

Publicity Committee

Handles all outside publicity for Club activities.

Audit Committee

Performs an annual audit of the Treasurer's records and reports the results.

Library Committee

Proposes acquisitions of books for the library, receives donations of books, and has custody of the Club Library.

Ways & Means Committee

Plans and conducts ways and means for raising money to finance Club projects and expenses.

Waiting in the Wings *There are about 300 birds in foster care each one with an endearing story*



BELLA is an eight-year-old female umbrella cockatoo. She is very expressive with her crest and will flair her wings for fun and excitement. She has some words in her vocabulary and loves to dance.



MOLLY is a young 11-year old blue and gold macaw. She's a bit fuzzy because she's been a tad hard on her feathers in recent years. But Rosetta is teaching her to eat a top notch healthy diet, and her feathers are coming back and a starting to shine. She has a very fun disposition, loves to chatter, and share the good times with her new friends.



CHARLOTTE is a 24 yr old lesser sulphur crested cockatoo. She's shy and has a bad leg/bad balance but once she gets to trust you she is a real sweet bird. She is also EXTREMELY quiet. She'd have no problem being placed in an apartment. She NEVER makes noise.

From the soon to be published Nourish to Flourish, A Healthy Cookbook for Parrots **PUMPKIN CRANBERRY BREAD**

- 2 ¼ cups flour
- 5/8 tsp ginger
- ¼ tsp cloves
- 1 ½ tsp cinnamon
- 2 beaten eggs
- ½ cup applesauce
- 1 cup pumpkin
- 1 cup chopped cranberries
- ½ cup chopped walnuts

In a large bowl, combine flour and spices. Add applesauce and pumpkin to eggs; beat thoroughly. Add pumpkin mixture to dry ingredients; stir just until moistened. Stir in cranberries and walnuts. Spoon batter into 1 large cast iron skillet or 2 lightly oiled loaf pans. Bake at 350° for 50-60 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean. Cool before serving to the birds.
(Can also be made as a muffin)

Refined **flour**, like refined sugar, is not healthy. For recipes that call for flour, consider making your own by quickly grinding whole oats, quinoa, or even garbanzo beans. In addition, there are some great flours on the market now. Try bobsredmill.com/flours-meals/ for some great ideas.

Pumpkin provides Vitamin A. Vitamin A is "mission essential" for your birds health. Beta-carotene is a red/orange pigment found in fruits and plants, and it is the precursor to this important vitamin. Once consumed, the liver turns the beta-carotene into vitamin A and stores it for future use. The darker the flesh (the inside, not the skin) of the vegetable or fruit, the higher the beta carotene content. Vegetables can be fed raw but are sometimes more digestible if lightly cooked (steamed or baked by preference). However, note that overcooking can destroy vitamin content.

Walnuts provide Omega 3 Essential Fatty Acid.

Ginger is an anti-inflammatory and may help with arthritis.

Cinnamon has several benefits, it lowers cholesterol, helps yeast infections, has anti-inflammatory qualities that can lessen joint and muscle pain, especially the joint pain associated with arthritis. inhibits bacteria growth and spoilage, and is a great source of manganese, fiber, iron, and calcium.
