Kakapo Movie February 13

This film took four years to produce and shows the efforts of the Kakapo Recovery Programme to save the Kakapo, a critically endangered nocturnal ground dwelling parrot species in New Zealand, from the brink of extinction of only 49 birds to 122 today. Kakapo Parrot News

1/14/2011 Original Kakapo Recovery Programme Parrot Dies

One of the original 49 kakapo who were found in 1975 and put into the Kakapo breeding program in order to preserve the species has died at a conservative estimated age of 80 years of natural causes. He was named Richard Henry after the pioneering Fiordland caretaker of kakapo and kiwi. He fathered three chicks, who are now adults in the program. There have been 121 kakapos born under the Kakapo Recovery Programme.

1/1/2011 The Kakapo Recovery Programme Hope for Large Number of Kakapo Chicks This Breeding Season

The staff at the Kakapo Recovery Programme hope for more at least 33 Kakapo chicks hatched this season, which was the number hatched in 2008 due to an increasing number of breeding females. The staff cannot monitor all of the nests in the way that they had been due to the increased number of nests so this year they will be using electronic monitoring equipment to determine if a female is sitting on a nest.

Minutes from Business Meeting during Holiday Party 12/5/10

Carol Rees introduced the main topic, which was whether or not to remain members of BCV. In summary, the issues are that a delegate is needed to attend planning meetings and organize any future NCBC involvement and we don't have a volunteer for that job. Given other pros and cons that Carol described, she does not see any benefit for us to remain BCV members. John Davey proposed to end our involvement. He was seconded. A unanimous vote carried the proposal. NCBC members may still attend the BCV annual convention if desired, and we can revisit the issue in the future if needed.

Another issue for our club is low membership due to members moving away, giving up bird ownership, and lack of new members joining. Various members stated that other clubs (Quaker Parrot club, the BCV, and the international Pionus Breeder Assn., and non-bird related clubs) are also in the same situation. It seems that in general, people are not joining clubs and may be using the internet to fulfill the needs formerly satisfied by clubs. However, for some in NCBC, online socializing does not replace the in-person contacts we have at our meetings! Members are interested in more advanced lecture topics, assistance with grooming birds, and love the newsletter. Mark Sargent pointed out that the current economy contributes to lack of breeding and purchasing of pet birds, and less need for clubs. That we can't bring our birds to meetings is an issue for some club members. John Davey asked if anyone had any ideas for a new meeting place that would be low-cost or free (preferably) and open to the birds. He said that Phoenix Landing is also looking for such a venue. Susan said that she would check McLean Community Center regarding the birds and stated that it requests a donation for using the premises.

Business was not the only order of the day – we all enjoyed the great food, company, and Jeanne's birds. Thanks to everyone for a great discussion, potluck contributions, and good time. Thanks to Jeanne for again hosting the party.

AFA PRESENTS AWARD TO LOWRY PARK ZOO FOR FIRST US BREEDING OF THE SHOEBILL STORK

ST. PETERSBURG, FLORIDA - The American Federation of Aviculture, Inc. AVY Award Committee presented a First U.S. Breeding Award to Tampa's Lowry Park Zoo during the 36 annual convention, in recognition of the successful breeding of the rare Shoebill Stork. The award marks the accomplishment of Lowry Park Zoo as the first institution in North America - and the second institution globally - to hatch an African Shoebill Stork chick in captivity.

Accepting the award on behalf of Lowry Park Zoo - presented during the Saturday evening banquet - were Vice President and Director of Collections Lawrence E. Killmar, Ph.D., and Animal Care Manager of The Aviary, Julie Tomita. Bird Keepers Kelley Campbell, and Marcus Kowitz were acknowledged as part of the team effort.

The team worked diligently to observe and document parental feeds, nutrition, health, safety and growth of the chick. The detailed application and accompanying photographs provided by Dr. Killmar were presented to the AVY Award Committee members for investigation and confirmation in order to verify the award.

The zoo maintains two adult pair of Shoebills within its Ituri Forest exhibit. Many of the AFA members who signed up for the behind-the-scenes tour of Lowry Park Zoo during the St. Petersburg convention Wednesday afternoon were able to observe the Shoebills, including the fully weaned chick that appeared as tall as the parents.

Because the Shoebill population is rare in captivity, and uncommon in the wild, the First North American breeding is heralded an impressive success and achievement for Lowry Park Zoo. The information acquired on the Shoebill will help in the conservation and continuation of this highly unique species, rarely if ever seen in zoos. Additionally, as part of the requirements of an AFA First U.S. Breeding AVY Award, Lowry Park Zoo has provided an article on the Shoebill for the AFA Watchbird journal.

The 2010-2011 AFA AVY Awards Committee members include Josef H. Lindholm III, Jason Crean, Philip J. Ryan, Ph.D., Jerry Jennings, and Linda S. Rubin (chair). A sincere thank you to the committee members for their diligence, dedication, and time working to investigate and confirm this historical award. Proposed Legislation in New Mexico

New Mexico Proposed Regulations of Non-Domestic Animals, Birds, and Fish Under Title 19 Natural Resources and Wildlife, Chapter 35 Captive Wildlife Uses, Part 7 Importation of Live Non-Domestic Animals, Birds and Fish.

Update: The rules under the New Mexico captive wildlife law have been finalized. Your AFA took part in the development of the lists of avian species. As it stands there are four lists, numbered 1 through 4, where list 1 are the species that do not require a "State import permit" to be brought into New Mexico, and where list 4 does require a permit. Through much coordination between PIJAC, AFA members and the AFA CITES Committee Chair, Rick Jordan, and input from the New Mexico State Coordinator, Sandee Brennan, as well as several commercial AFA members (Darlene Parker and others) and pet stores, most psittacines are listed on list 1 and do not require a permit. However, any parrot species also listed under the U.S. Endangered Species Act is still listed on list 4 and will require State approval to be brought into the State. Be advised there are several common species on this list including Scarlet-chested Parakeets, Turquoise Parakeets, Hooded Parakeets, and Golden Conures, Cuban and Vinaceous Amazons and a few others.

If you would like to read the official AFA position paper on the New Mexico import law, below is an excerpt and a link to the entire document.

"The American Federation of Aviculture (AFA) submits that there is insufficient scientific and/or commercial data to support the proposals that psittacine species, as well as the many species of birds that are commonly kept in captivity in New Mexico and throughout the United States (either as pets or as breeders), should be treated as non-domestic, or as dangerous, or as invasive, or as likely to cause harm to the economy, environment, protected wildlife, human health or safety in New Mexico..." **To read more, go to www.afabirds.org**

Parrot News from Around the World

2/7/2011 Sixty-five Animals Freeze to Death in Mexican Zoo Including 14 Parrots

The Chihuahua Zoo in the city of Aldama, Mexico lost 10% of its animals. When temperatures dropped to 5F, they turned on the gas lines on Friday before they left. From the article it sounded like there was no one on the premises during the night to notice that the gas lines were frozen and not working. When they returned at 6am on Saturday they then turned on emergency generators but it was too late for many animals, including fourteen parrots.

1/13/2011 750 African Greys Die on Flight from Johannesburg to Durban

750 African Grey Parrots died on December 24, 2010 on a flight operated by 1time that was flying from Johannesburg to Durban. These parrots were wild caught in the Democratic Republic of Congo and were to be sold to South African breeders. A small dog traveling in the same cargo hold was not affected. Parrots from the same group that were transported by other airlines were not affected. There is speculation that a lack of oxygen or toxic gas was the cause of death.

1/12/2011 Over 130 Smuggled African Grey Parrots Seized at the Ugandan Border

Ugandan officials seized over 130 African Grey Parrots on Uganda's Congolese border from a woman who was smuggling them from the Democratic Republic of Congo to Uganda. They were expected to be sold in Europe and Asia.

Most of the parrots were in critical condition and were taken to the Uganda Wildlife Education Center to recover. They will eventually be released back into the wild.

12/29/2010 Brazil Fights Illegal Animal Trafficking

Like in the United States, hunting or keeping wild animals in captivity is illegal in Brazil except with special authorization. Brazil employs 400 officers to fight animal trafficking, which is a billion dollar year industry in that country. It is estimated that about 40% of these animals end up in the United States and Europe with half of the animals dying in transit.

American Federation of Aviculture Online Course Fundamentals of Aviculture

Fundamentals of Aviculture is an entirely online course, written by Rick Jordan and Barbara Heidenreich and presented as nine beautifully illustrated chapters, with original photographs and with drawings by Lyrae Perry.

Rick Jordan wrote the first eight chapters which cover avian anatomy and physiology, reproductive functions and behaviors, illness prevention and detection, and aviary construction, taxonomic assignments, avicultural history and advancements, domestication of birds in aviculture, and laws and regulations governing aviculture. Barbara Heidenreich covers keys to understanding parrot behavior, pet parrot behavior modification and training.

Development of Fundamentals of Aviculture was made possible by a grant from Pet Care Trust, and by funding and other support from the Schubot Exotic Bird Health Center, and the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

This course includes nine tests. The graduate is certified by the American Federation of Aviculture as Aviculturist, Level I. This course is a prerequisite for Intermediate Aviculture.
